Quarterly Activities:

On April 1st, 2010, we served lunch to the missionaries for their Zone Conference. There were 46 people. We served pulled Italian Beef on rolls, green salad, chips, apples, and cupcakes for dessert. We used about 15 pounds of bottom round roast for the meat (3 recipes): 24 loaves of bread from Jimmy John's, each cut into 4

pieces: 2 large bags of salad from Sam's Club, with grape tomatoes and cucumbers, and 3 bottles of salad dressing: 1 package of 48 individual servings of chips; 24 apples and 72 cupcakes. We came out perfectly on the meat, several missionaries came back for a second sandwich, and a few had 3; we had a small amount of salad

left, no chips, a few apples, and a few cupcakes left over. Since it was April Fool's Day, we decided to decorate the cupcakes to look like mashed potatoes and peas &

carrots. It took a little longer to decorate them, but it was a lot of fun. For the peas & carrots we used green M&Ms and orange Starbursts cut up. For the mashed potatoes we used white frosting, yellow Starbursts for the butter, and caramel sauce for the gravy. We put the extra candy on the tables. Jackie Kitchen and Lisa Washburn planned the menu and did the shopping. That morning they prepared the food and Anahi Fernandez set the tables and helped decorate the cupcakes. Linda Bucey helped clean up the kitchen after the luncheon was over. The missionaries

seemed to really enjoy the meal, which was nice and easy to prepare.

4-5 pounds top or bottom round roast 1 pkg au jus mix 2 pkgs Good Season's Italian dressing mix (pwdr, can also use generic brand)

1 Tablespoon beef base garlic powder to taste, (a few crushed cloves of fresh garlic if available) salt and pepper to taste (may leave out salt) oregano (just sprinkle some, a teaspoon or two) 2 cups of water

Put all ingredients in a crock pot on low for 10-12 hours. Shred with a fork and serve on rolls.

You can get day old bread from Jimmy John's. You want to make sure that it is a good bread that won't go soggy within seconds of putting on the meat. Hamburger buns are not a good choice.
